It was a very nice presentation and we were able to put together both the corn and soybean suppliers in one plot to maximize plot day traffic for both groups. This plot will be in the same location year after year, and it is close to Olivia. We have hired Susan Johnson to start January 4th and expand our team. She has nearly 15 years of soybean breeding and yield trial experience from Iowa State. Please join us in welcoming Susan to our staff in Olivia.


#### **Wishing you a Merry and Blessed Christmas!**
