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Women in Agriculture

According to census bureau 14% of the farms in the United States are owned and operated by women. This is an increase from 9% in 1980. At 3MG in the last years our female labor force has grown from 18% to 34%.

When I think about the work we do in agriculture, the many photos of women workers that hang on our walls come to mind. Each one of these women has an important and special role. I am working in irrigation and see a drip line disconnected and water shooting out after I turned on the valve at the main hose to irrigate that section. During these 5 minutes, many gallons of water have pooled and started to run down the row, but I got it connected and move on. Job done. The sprayer needs to come through the field later in the day and drives through the wet spot created by an employee, me, "doing his job" and creates a deep track or worse yet runs down some crop. The deep track can create a work hazard for other employees that collect data or pollinate. The missing crop creates a problem for you the customer and us because we cannot deliver what was expected. What we tried to do last summer is develop an understanding about how even though I made the right decision for my job, I did not think about how it affects the next person's job. We will continue to work on these types of scenarios this summer to keep improving how we work together to deliver a better level of service to you.

During the past few months I have also been thinking about the larger picture of our business. We will be celebrating our 10-year anniversary of being open for business on July 7, 2015. Again, time flies when you are having fun! The realization of a decade of work at 3rd Millennium Genetics hit me hard these past few months. 
Q. How long have you worked for 3MG?

Seamless Shipping

At the mere suggestion of shipping seed to and from Puerto Rico, some people tremble in fear. Let us assure you that this is a painless process that can be seamless. We successfully receive and ship seed to over 10 different countries on 3 continents, and that number is growing. Have no fear, 3MG is here! There are several misconceptions and myths about shipping to and from Puerto Rico - let us dispel those myths.

Myth #1 "There are no phytosanitary field inspections in Puerto Rico."

FALSE. Although it is true that the US Department of Agriculture does not do field inspections on the island, we use Indiana Crop Improvement Association (ICIA) for all of our phytosanitary Field inspections.

Myth #2 "The certifications rendered by ICIA are not widely accepted.

FALSE. Our certification by ICIA is globally accepted.

Myth #3 "Courier services are unreliable in Puerto Rico."

FALSE. UPS, FedEx, DHL & USPS are all just as efficient in Puerto Rico as on the mainland.

All shipments to Puerto Rico require a phytosanitary certificate from the Department of Agriculture. To ensure that your shipment is not held by the Department of Agriculture upon entry to the island, we recommend that you ship the original documents separately while sending copies of the originals with the seeds. We continue to foster good working relationships with the local governmental authorities, and more often than not we can solve any issues from our end. If we cannot resolve it on our own, we will work with our clients to make the process as painless as possible. We will do all we can to avoid the materials being returned to the sender.

When shipping regulated materials, it is imperative that the triple containment rule be observed. These seeds must be double boxed and either be contained by envelopes, bags or mesh to ensure that there is no accidental spillage. Furthermore, be sure to label all regulated shipments with contact information of the person who is responsible in the case of accidental spillage. Also, please include any associated permit numbers and label the packages as regulated materials.

As a full service company, 3MG is here to help you at every stage of the process of your agronomic project. Yes, that includes shipping. Hopefully this article will give you some helpful guidelines to make the process easier.
